Last month we also enjoyed The Shape of Things, 42<sup>nd</sup> Street and Alphabetical Order – three very different productions that brought in great audiences.

Coming up, Joe Orton's swinging sixties, black comedy Entertaining Mr Sloane is our LDS play for this month, directed by Sally Bruton. Later this month, I'll be on stage myself in 9 to 5: the Musical, directed by Steve Duguid, playing in my first lead role!

Currently in the making, the two-person cast of Educating Rita is gearing up to rehearsals for their performance in January. I'm thrilled to see part of the cast list for the very first LDS musical The Railway Children (full announcement coming

There were various workshops run, such as improv with Tom Young, diversity in theatre, and social media management with Sharon Clement of Cross Productions. # Have things changed in 80 years?

A look at front of house rules compared with the 1940s By Frances Harris - Trustee for Front of House

### How have things changed in 80 years?

Recently, lisa thirlby was kind enough to show me the front of house duties from the 1940s. Although most are basic common sense – which still prevail – I have to admit one or two items made me glad we've moved on a little.

### The House Manager

'You should arrive 10 minutes before the doors are opened to the public.'

In 2022, the manager is there half an hour before, as radios and terminals have to be unplugged and taken to the foyer, with the equipment made ready for the staff. There is also a general check round to make sure everything is in order before the public are admitted.

### **Gas Lighting**

'The following gas jets are lit. Main stairs 4, light boxes 4, rear stairs 1, backstage stairs 1, stage door entrance 2. Total lights 12.'

Thank goodness for electricity! (ed's note: nowadays our only gaslighting is in *The Shape of Things*).

#### Refreshments

'See that the coffee tables are all ready for serving and that the stewards carry in the coffee urns at least ten minutes before the coffee interval.' And: 'Arrange for the stewards to help at the coffee tables by tipping up the coffee urns for the servers and help in any ways possible, if requested by the coffee supervisor.' ... I think we all prefer the ice cream trolley in the auditorium and the queues at the bar.

#### Latecomers

This appears in a couple of sections, worded slightly differently but the message is the same: "After the curtain rises, suggest to latecomers with centre seats that they stand in the gangway until the curtain falls, or occupy accessible empty seats until the interval."

Pardon? Nobody is allowed to stand in the gangway! We do place latecomers in suitable seats so other patrons are not disturbed. At the pantomime, we ask they wait for applause so that performers are not distracted.

This is theatre and you can't beat live entertainment, especially the quality provided at the little.

As I watched, I found myself relating to Rachael Humphrey's character of Leslie. "Oh my goodness," I thought, "I'm coming to see this play and I think I might be

the villain of the piece!"

As the play will be over when this edition of Scene goes out, if I relate more to Leslie, I think I'll keep it to myself! The play looks really good and I'm looking forward to seeing it.

Joe took the lead as we toured backstage before we headed back to the bar. We're delighted to have some new members! Thanks to Sally Bruton and Paul Beasley for allowing us to preview their plays.

We had the pleasure of working with Michael on many productions and very much appreciated his help in the Panto Kids' Bar for many years. His passions included science and music as well as drama and we had many interesting conversations whilst Michael very kindly sharpened interminable numbers of crayons for the colouring competition and changed hundreds of batteries in flashing lights over the years. As well as his regular performances on stage, he was also a valuable member of the Marketing Team for several years. Julia, Michael's wife has sent the following message: "The Little was a lifeline for Michael when we first moved up to Leicester. I am still amazed to see the number of productions Michael was in (we have all the programme) - my particular favourites being 'A Number' in the Studio, 'Lady Windermere's Fan' in the main theatre, his one-off presentation on Dylan Thomas (filling a gap in a One Act Play Festival), and, of course, his voice as the Giant in 'Jack and the Beanstalk'!



Thank you to all who knew him and put up with his occasionally irascible nature."

Michael's funeral will be held on Wednesday, November 2 at 3.30pm at Great Glen Crematorium. Family flowers only but donations, if desired, to Prisoners' Education Trust, or Crisis.

## **Kathie Layfield**

1940 - 2022

The name Kathie Layfield may not be very familiar to many present members of the Little Theatre but in her early days she was actively involved in many aspects of the Theatre, which included running ARENA, the Theatre's student group. She was an extremely versatile and talented lady who was an accomplished musician.

At the Theatre, Kathie, who had a very good singing voice, appeared in a number of productions in the early 1960s and 1970s including *Dark Of The Moon, The Prime Of Miss Jean Brodie, Picnic* and the role of Rosa in *The Rose Tattoo*.

Her illustration skills were put to good use in the designing of more than fourteen memorable sets from When We Are Married. Kathie also liked the challenge of the more demanding design needs of The Royal Hunt Of The Sun, A Flea In Her Ear, Henry V and The Taming Of The Shrew.

She also used her imagination to create a huge number of costume designs. Her illustrations were beautifully drawn, particularly the male characters who were always extremely tall and slim. I remember the military costumes in *Cinderella* which caused problems




for the wardrobe department when they had to adjust the design to fit a motley assortment of different sized gentlemen of the chorus.

An exhibition of her costumes was mounted on the upstairs gallery. I suggested that she meet the editorial team at Ladybird where I was Art Director. They commissioned her to illustrate a book on nursery rhymes. Her style proved so popular that she went on to illustrate over thirty titles for Ladybird, mainly for well-loved fairytales. The books are still around today and Kathie would have been proud of the enjoyment she'd brought to children and the lasting legacy she's left behind. Roy Smith

## **A Note From the Archives**

We put together a display for the Heritage Open Day (September 10) which brought out of storage several items that rarely see the light of day, and which demonstrated the breadth and scope of LDS's archives. Production programmes, photos and crits are just a small part of what we hold. Though not a complete collection, we have the society's committee minutes from the very beginnings - these are an invaluable record, especially if one is trying to write about our history! Scrapbooks donated by former members, from the 1930s onwards, offer a different insight into years of the society's story. There are folders of press cuttings and photographs about the buildings, the chapel, our former patron, our years at The Minack, and so on...

Following the sad death of our former archivist, Jim O'Donoghue earlier this year, we were fortunate to receive a generous donation from his estate to be used in the conservation of the society's archives. This is enabling us to make a start on transferring the production records into acid-free storage, particularly important for the early years where the programmes are becoming very fragile.

We are continuing with the huge task of writing actors' names on the back of production photos. There is also a

large box of 'unknown' items, which we will get round to sorting one day.

Going through the boxes of production records, we've found that they are incomplete. Here is a list of some things we don't have:

1954-55 - The Castiglione Brothers by Alberto Colantuoni, directed by Leslie Walker.

Nothing - no programme or photos.

1988-89 - Old Time Music Hall,
directed by Thea Craine. No photographs.

1990-91 - The Sea by Edward Bond,
directed by Josè Johnson. No photographs.

1992-93 - Passion Play by Peter Nichols,
directed by Michael Lynch. No photographs

1997-98 - April in Paris by John Godber,
directed by Judy Price. No photographs.

# **Board Report**

The Trustees typically meet at the end of each month, (with the exception of summer months due to holidays).

After a break in August, they met again on September 25 to review management of the Theatre.

There is generally a lot to discuss as you might imagine, and each trustee reports on their area of responsibility.

Following Jeremy Thompson's resignation from the Board, Tom Young has agreed to be co-opted to extend his role to become Marketing & Outreach Trustee. The two important roles work well together, as both involve work to reach our regular and new patrons, as well as drama groups and partners that might be interested in working with us. Thanks to Tom for agreeing to extend his role.

The 200 Club draw took place with September's results posted in the last issue of Scene. Do consider joining the 200 Club if you want a chance of winning a cash prize each month. This helps us raise money for the Building Fund.

From the Treasurers Report, Jenny advised that our energy prices for electricity and gas have now doubled and whilst bar takings have generally been lower, high attendance on certain shows yields good takings with lower overheads thanks to the happy band of volunteers who work the bar these days.

We will ensure that our future productions are ones that people want to see, as our theatre costs around £1,500 per day to run. Season ticket sales are up on last year which is good news. We are getting good takings from costume hires, despite having reduced paid staff now – thanks to John Bale for his efforts here.

In September, the Heritage Open Day proved to be really popular, with the history of the theatre well documented in the studio for all to view. Thanks to all technical, front-of-house and bar volunteers for all their help with this event.

Tom noted he wants to look at new ways of getting our audiences to return for future shows and we explored different ideas for alerting those who do come about upcoming shows, following a performance. The meeting reflected on how successful the first play of the season, *Black Coffee* by Agatha Christie, was. It gathered over 20% of additional sales in the production week after the excellent reviews posted on social media.


The trustees were also really pleased to hear that the Society had received the "Community Impact" award at the Niche Magazine Business Awards.
