James Cowen



James Cowen will be playing the lead role in this month's youth theatre production of *James and the Giant Peach*.

Fourteen years old, James attends English Martyrs Catholic School, where he is studying GCSE Drama. He lives with his mum, dad and older sister, Anna.

When he was seven years of age, he became interested in drama and quickly joined the LDS youth theatre (YT). He told me he learned a lot of very valuable skills from Paul Phillips and is really enjoying his time with the current YT leader, Andy Longley-Brown.

James's previous roles include Harlequin, a carpenter, and Günther, an escapologist, in last year's YT production, *Pinocchio*. He tells me the comic escapologist was a part that he created himself for the circus scene of the show and that the audience seemed to really enjoy it. Last year, he also played Michael Banks in a school production of *Mary Poppins*. James told me that he gets a lot out of coming to the youth theatre, particularly because they get a chance to show what they can do on the big stage.

A lover of music, James plays piano, organ, clarinet, and violin, as well as being a singer. He sings bass in Leicester Cathedral Choir, which he says helps him a lot with diction, projection, and performance in general. Additionally, James plays the organ at St Mary's Parish Church in Anstey once a month, and for school assemblies. Last year, he played the organ at Christ Church Oxford, as part of an evensong that his school liturgical choir, Schola Cantorum, participated in.

He also writes his own music and this year entered one of his

compositions into Leicester Musicfest, where he was awarded first prize in the under-18 Junior Composition Competition category.



Review: Bedroom Farce

March 6-11 Directed by Mary Jones

What a pleasure to leave the theatre with a lighter step. Directed by Mary Jones, Bedroom Farce was a delight. Very well acted and all totally believable. Staged during the week of International Women's Day, it felt appropriate as it showed up that men aren't as superior as they may like to think!

We begin with the older couple, Ernest (Adam Jones) and Delia (Karen Gordon). We knew who wore the trousers; Ernest didn't say much, but his demeanour said it all. Adam Jones is such a clever actor and I found myself waiting for him to come back on stage – a perfect foil for Delia. They were two people living together with totally different agendas.

Their dysfunctional son Trevor (Andy Longley-Brown), who really is everybody's nightmare 'friend' (the sort when you see him coming down the street, you lock all the doors and hide under the bed). Trevor is being pursued by his equally dysfunctional, lacking-in-confidence wife Susannah (Helen White).

Then we move to Nick (Jordan Handford) who has put his back out and is making sure his long-suffering wife Jan (Diani Gatenby Davies) knows it, as did the whole of the audience. I don't think I'll ever forget the scene in which he tried to retrieve his book, or when Jan tries to help him back into bed – so hilarious.

Finally, we have Kate (Rachael Humphrey) and Malcolm (Simon Butler) – the young couple setting up for married life in a dilapidated, fixer-upper home, who are hosting a housewarming party. Kate filled Malcolm with anxiety when she revealed she sometimes gets bored during intimate moments and thinks about varnishing the floorboards!

I don't think I'll ever get over the flatpack gift he'd bought Kate as a surprise. We've all been there, haven't we ladies, when a) it's all the instruction manual's fault, b) they've put in the wrong screws, or c) they didn't tell you, you need a Phillips screwdriver. The banging and cursing you hear off stage lead to complete comedy gold when you see the 'finished' article.

I thoroughly enjoyed this play and would've seen it again, if I'd had time.

Connections Report

We had a good turn out for Connections on February 28, and as usual, we went on a tour around the theatre. We visited 52 Up, for one of the last rehearsals of *Bedroom Farce*. We got to see Ernest (Adam Jones) and Delia (Karen Gordon) enjoying pilchards on toast in bed to celebrate their wedding anniversary (each to their own), albeit Delia preferred sardines. I have been in to see a few bits of rehearsals and am amazed how observant director Mary Jones is; whilst everything is going on, Mary picks up on little things which, when retried, make a difference you wouldn't believe.

We then went to 52 Down to see a rehearsal of *The Railway Children*, where director Leigh White was putting the children through their paces. It was lovely to see the kids enjoying themselves and so committed. It's looking good – hope you've all got your tickets.

When we eventually arrived in the auditorium, the fit-up for *Bedroom Farce* was in progress with Martin Scott, stage manager Russell Hughes and scenic designer Phil Newman all hard at work. Phil agreed to talk to the group about how he designs a set; preferring not to use a computer, but instead making an open 3D effect box. This is a scale mock-up of the stage with all the components built in miniature form. In effect, you can see exactly what it will look like. It's so aesthetic to touch and look at, and – for me – better than viewing on a computer. It was like

having a miniature doll's house. Phil explained that he has to take exits and entrances into consideration because it's a farce, and the action on the stage will eventually move faster. It's almost a shame that on the last night of the production, as soon as the audience has left the auditorium, the strike gang move in and pull it all down (I'd cry). At least Phil has the box to remember and keep.

Returning to the auditorium, Tim Neville and Stew Wale were working on sound design and Jenny Harding on lighting. Goodness, when you sit in the audience, you really have no idea how much work goes on to make the production all come together – and let's not forget: these folk are all volunteers. When you read this, the play will be done and dusted, so I hope you all managed to see it.

Whilst in the auditorium, Ali Levy and I saw a Remembrance Plaque attached to a seat in Row L. What a good idea to remember a loved one, who so enjoyed their time at the Little Theatre. In The Spotlight

Name: David Lovell

Age: 54, but my playing age seems to be 70+ these days!

Profession: College Manager

Upcoming production: The Old Gentleman in *The Railway Children*

and Elisha Whitney in Anything Goes

Noteworthy: I was privileged to be the first voice on The Little Theatre stage when we returned after lockdown in May 2021 with Spread A Little Happiness – a proud, but sobering occasion, and a very great honour.

What was the first theatre show you saw?

My first theatre show should have been Jesus Christ Superstar at the Palace Theatre, London, around 1975, but thanks to a bout of colic, my poor parents and I had to miss the show. The first show that truly resonated with me was one of Robert Mandell's outings of Joseph and the Amazing Technicolour Dreamcoat at Haymarket Theatre, Leicester in the 70s. I was in the Leicester Cathedral Choir and some of my fellow choristers were lucky enough to be in it. For quite a while, I claimed to have been in it too, but this was wishful thinking!

What was the first play/musical you were in?

In my school drama group in 1985, I played Arthur Dent in a bootleg production of The Hitchhikers Guide to the Galaxy. The budget meant we couldn't have afforded stage rights to perform it, so we just underlined the dialogue in the books and ran with it. I still have those defaced books. My first proper onstage experience was at Newcastle University in 1988, in the chorus of Gilbert & Sullivan's rarely performed, last collaboration, The Grand Duke. I joined because I quite fancied the Chairman, which was a challenge as I wasn't out at the time, and he

was most definitely straight! Thirty years later, in 2018, I returned to *The Grand Duke* playing the title character for Trent Opera at the Royal Hall, Harrogate, as part of the International Gilbert & Sullivan Festival, for which I received a Best Male Performer nomination.

What's your favourite role you've played to date (and why)?

They don't get much better than Frank in Educating Rita. To work with the supremely talented Leeann Rana as Rita and spend almost the entire two hours on stage exploring this deeply flawed but equally inspirational character, was an experience I'll never forget.

What's your dream role that you're yet to play (and why)?

I once played Buddy in Sondheim's Follies, a tragi-comic role who has a bit of a breakdown in the middle of the show. I found I enjoyed the catharsis of 'losing my mind'. I'd love to try a good tragedy – anybody fancy doing King Lear?

What's the best theatre show you've ever seen?

The Producers, Theatre Royal Drury Lane, 2004. My (now) husband and I were staying in London for a few days and had seen all the publicity on the Underground with Richard Dreyfus and Lee Evans as Max and Leo. When we read that Dreyfus was given the boot four days before the first preview performance and that Nathan Lane had been flown over to reprise his Max, we had to try to see it. We maxed out the credit card, but it didn't disappoint, even when Lane tripped over the set, adlibbing about how his office seemed different, but couldn't tell how!

What's your favourite thing about The Little Theatre?

Community, opportunity, escape. It's the people who make The Little such a home-from-home. Whenever I'm at the theatre I know I'm part of a family who appreciates everything everybody does. The Little has given me the most amazing opportunities to play, have fun, and work with wonderful actors, directors and techies. Where else can I forget my day job and pretend to be a renowned phonetician, a doctor, an Oxford don, the boss of Ford UK, a police inspector, an alcoholic university lecturer, an overblown amateur ham actor? Well...

Tell us about your upcoming production!

The Railway Children is a charmingly told story about coping with a missing loved one, and learning about fighting injustice. Then I sail away on the S.S. American, where Anything Goes, apparently!
