She now works as a healthcare assistant in a GP surgery and really enjoys her job.

Her love of theatre stems from her mum's love of theatre and being taken to see shows at an early age. Lydia joined The Little in 2019 and has worked backstage for a few plays and panto. Eventually, she was approached by Doug Simpson and asked if she'd be interested in stage managing. With help and training from Doug and Simon Dickens, she's now got a few plays in her repertoire. Lydia has stage-managed for *Bracken Moor, Rabbit Hole*, and *Alphabetical*

Order amongst others. She was also joint stage manager for The Railway Children with Fraser Tew – if you managed to spot two folks pushing the connecting platform in costume then you got a brief glimpse of Lydia and Fraser. 

The Third Step

Chris Hall, a cherished member of The Little, has proven herself not only to be a stage creative but a writer too! She's written a novel about her life experiences. The Third Step of the Stairs contains snapshots of Chris's life from birth in 1941 through to when she lost her husband in 2012. It takes a journey of a dysfunctional family, five girls and one boy and what it was like growing up together and the things we got up to. It covers village life, teenage years to adolescence and boyfriends, her choice of career in nursing, meeting her future husband and courtship, and eventually marrying and moving to Leicestershire, as well as the arrival of her children and the trials of repeated ill health in her husband, which at times stopped the family in their tracks. Life interspersed with him having to have two major heart operations. Chris's nursing continued, essential to find work to help pay the mortgage. The Third Step of the Stairs also goes into detail about pursuing hobbies, joining a drama group then moving on to amateur operatic societies, the excitement of auditions and the challenges of the production especially costume fitting. Chris says that life has been a roller coaster ride, sometimes sad but mostly joyful and that writing this book has been a cathartic exercise.

Judy is going to be made redundant and is trying to persuade Johnny that it would be good for them both if she stayed at home as a housewife. She seemingly promises Johnny 'Life of Riley', but at one point during this persuasion, Johnny did mention she can't cook – Judy manages to gloss over this with 'I can learn'. I will definitely be buying tickets for this one as I can't wait to see how this pans out!

John showed the group a 3D mock-up of how the set will look and explained the workings of the set, which looks impressive. The set designer Al Davis was the

owner of Bones the Theatre Dog who sadly passed away last year. Deviating from Connections with some news, Al came into the theatre with Hazel, a seven-month-old Collie mix rescue puppy who is absolutely delightful and so affectionate. We all had a cuddle and she's certainly got a human fan club in the theatre. However, back to business. Thank you, John, for giving the group a bit of your time in your busy rehearsal schedule.

The group then looked around the props store, studio, and workshop, before making our way into the first on-stage dress rehearsal of *The Railway Children* in the auditorium. We caught a bit of the rehearsal which was looking good; Gem Greaves' set was amazing. We hope you all managed to see it.

Several of the prospective new members took application forms so hopefully, they enjoyed the experience, and we'll see them around the theatre soon.

Review: Anything Goes

I saw Anything Goes by Leicester Operatic players (LOPS) with three friends. What an amazing show. I always try to be a glass half full in life and when I come to see a show at The Little, I'm often not disappointed – albeit the reason being these amateur actors, dancers and singers are, in my opinion, just as good as professionals, if not better. This show was so well put together from the set, musicians and cast.

I met Steve Elliott on Monday the day before the grand opening and I mistook him for the set designer, not realising he was the director, but that's amateurs for you! They have to be able to turn their hands to everything. Looking at the programme, I realised I have seen most of the productions that Steve has directed and enjoyed them all.

My friend and I attend Sound Bites at the Attenborough Arts Centre on Tuesday lunchtimes and Natasha Carr sometimes does a turn. As I had already seen her in 42nd Street, I knew she was talented. My friends were impressed and wanted to see her on stage playing Hope Harcourt in Anything Goes. They were not disappointed and when we discussed the show afterwards, they couldn't believe the energy that was present on stage. How they all keep it up night after night I will never know because they also have day jobs.

I don't want to single anyone out because they were all brilliant but one of my friends went on and on about the 'Gypsy in Me' performed by Lizzie Bywater-Florence as Reno Sweeney and Russell Webster as Lord Evelyn Oakleigh. The number was a cross between a Flamenco and tango of sorts. Whatever it was, it was certainly different! I really enjoyed this production so much, in fact, I went to see it again.

Review: The Railway Children: A musical

We came to see *The Railway Children* on the first Sunday performance and although I had been privy to bits of the rehearsal, I wasn't quite sure what to expect with it being put to music.

Some years previously I had taken my grandson, Joshua, to see a play of *The Railway Children* at Curve, and while I didn't really enjoy it, Josh loved it - though he was more interested in the technical aspect of the staging.

I'm not biased, but I've got to confess, I loved The Little's production of it. I enjoyed Mr Perks the stationmaster (Tom Young), narrating/singing us through the sequence of events. I thought the chemistry between the Mother (Amanda Sadler) and Bobbie (Scarlett Hubbard) was lovely and moved me to tears at times. I loved the children – didn't they do well? At times, owning the stage.

The set by Gem Greaves was amazing. I'll let you into a little secret – I saw the engine being made in the workshop by Dave Towers, and it's incredible what you can achieve with wood. Dave is so talented. The

costumes were so in keeping with the times – obviously sorted by our equally talented John Bale costume designer/dame extraordinaire.

There was so much talent in this production, not least the director and musical director, Leigh White, and assistant director, Joe Middleton.

I do have one little tiny, almost miniscule criticism: why did we have to throw cases onto the stage when there was a landslide?

As I'm writing this, Beulah, who co-ordinated props on this production, has arrived to do her stint in the box office. She tells me they had to make jam sandwiches for the children to eat in the production. Usually, they'd throw them away after the performance, but some of the kids cottoned on to this and asked her to keep hold of them. Jam sandwiches – always popular, and never go out of fashion.

What was the first theatre show you saw?

Rather bizarrely, the first show I clearly remember going to see was Shakespeare's *Titus Andronicus* at the RSC in Stratford with my friend and her family, aged 11! Given the rather violent material, I managed to emerge from the experience unscathed by the gore, murder and violence and instead came away totally awestruck by an amazing performance by Brian Cox and the whole company, and with a lifelong love for Shakespeare.

What was the first play/musical you were in?

The first production I appeared in was RATS The Musical at primary school when I was in year six. I played Alderman Greedy, the corrupt, double-crossing town mayor. I had to wear a padded fat suit and, for some reason, chose to attempt a strong Brummie accent. My dear dad always used to say that this show remained one of his favourite shows that I performed in.

What's your favourite role you've played to date (and why)?

I was lucky enough to play the role of Helena in A Midsummer Night's Dream for over a year and because she seemed so identifiable to me, I never grew tired of her. I found the combination of her wit, sadness and silliness constantly engaging. Ruth in *Blithe Spirit* a few years later was another favourite. I found her emotional journey from calm, composed, elegant hostess passing through a raging, baffled scold to a mischievous ghost so enjoyable to play.

What's your dream role that you're yet to play (and why)?

I'm always quite interested in flawed characters whether dramatic or comedic. So, generally, someone mad, bad or sad is always an interesting challenge for me. Gosh, so many to choose from, but off the top of my head, I'd say Marquise de Merteuil in Les Liaisons Dangereuses, Mrs Raffi in The Sea or Martha in Who's Afraid of Virginia Woolf? Or maybe some Scottish Shakespeare...!

What's the best theatre show you've ever seen?

That's a tough one so I'm just going with something that I've seen fairly recently: Harry Potter and the Cursed Child. I took my son to see it last year and was so by impressed how they create the magic in the play through such clever and brilliant use of stagecraft (and not just special effects). I loved how this worked so well and how

it created space for some really top-notch performances in the show, especially from the younger actors. Truthful, funny and so well observed.

What's your favourite thing about The Little Theatre?

The Little Theatre is such a welcoming and friendly organisation to be part of. Everyone is kind and encouraging, which creates a positive environment for people to come together and work on a show. There is a great deal of dedication, passion and hard work driven by a very professional approach, which is demonstrated in the wonderful quality of the productions that they put on.


Tell us about your upcoming production!


