## **Member Profile**

## **Hilary Cooper**

Introducing Hilary Cooper, one of our Front of House managers. You can usually meet Hilary in the main foyer on Saturday nights at the theatre.

Hilary was born in Perivale near Wembley. Her family moved to Kirby before she was two years old, so she's always called Leicestershire home. She lived near the castle and found this pretty magical as a small child. In her own words she's 'a rebellious teenager and left school without any useful qualification, much to her parents' disgust as they were sure she was university-bound'.

Hilary was never keen on a 9-to-5 desk job but went to work for British Shoe in the buying office, which at least had the perk of seeing the latest fashions.

Married young, Hilary started a family and now has five children, four step-children, and – wait for it – 18

grandkids! Hilary has had a range of unusual jobs, spending many years working in market research, visiting peoples' homes to learn about cat food! How times have changed, as Hilary wouldn't dream of entering strangers' homes these days.

When Hilary's youngest son Sam was small, she worked evening shifts in a canteen for nine years and then moved to work in his school canteen, and eventually moving to her old primary school as a dinner lady. Hilary moved her 90-year-old mum in and nursed her for two years. Alongside all these jobs, she worked in dance schools for over 20 years, and for the last 11 years, she has worked for her daughter, who is now the principal of her own school Amy Billington Dance Academy.

Hilary's on-stage history is with the Kirby Muxloe players, firstly in panto,

then Old Time Music Halls and two farces – sharing the stage with The Little's very own Michael Ball and directed by the late John Saunders. Having also been in numerous pantos with the dance schools, Hilary joined The Little Theatre through her son Sam who had done his FOH training as part of his drama degree at De Montfort University and had also been on stage in Weird Sisters.

After the pandemic, whilst trying to get Sam back into the theatre, Hilary got caught up in the enthusiasm thanks to Frances Harris, joined herself, and has never looked back. Hilary really enjoys interacting with audience members, other volunteers and staff, finding it a lovely atmosphere to work in and feels useful and valued. She considers it one of the best things she's ever done and – with all the previously mentioned kids – it's a great escape.

Hilary has a very close link to autism and is a Trustee and on the committee of an autism charity called Miracles to Believe I', which provides activities and opportunities for young people on the spectrum. On New Year's Eve, the charity is bringing a party of over 120 to watch *Puss in Boots*.

Thanks to Hilary for sharing her life with us.

## Roles we're recruiting for:

### **Technical Trustee**

Responsible for all technical aspects of the theatre, this trustee will:

- Lead the work of the backstage co-ordination team and be responsible for the health and safety needs of each technical activity, liaising with the facilities team as necessary
- Collaborate with the production team and attend meetings as necessary (e.g. discussion of season calendar, budgeting)
- Co-operate with the Productions Trustee regarding scenery, sets, storage, renewals, and fit-up schedules
- Encourage planning for technical renewals and innovation, taking proposals to the facilities team or the trustees as appropriate

- Be involved in the appointment of freelance set designers
- Oversee the backstage coordination of any non-LDS performances from a technical viewpoint

### Trustee without specific responsibility

While this vacancy doesn't have a specific portfolio attached, it exists to offer support to any other department that requires assistance. It's a flexible role with the opportunity to get involved in a variety of duties.

This role will replace the existing Trustee for The Studio position. The studio will be overseen below board level by studio co-ordinator, Russell Hughes.

# Obituary: Antonia Collins 1970-2023

Were you a member of The Little Theatre in 1986 when Antonia Collins (née Kennell) first joined us? She stayed with us for two years before she went on to The Welsh College of Music and Drama.

In that time, she helped us with a Mina production when she decided that backstage work was more for her than acting. She toured with Celia Mackay of ARC Theatre Company as Stage Manager – working on shows such as *Happy as a Sandbag*. She worked with many names that are familiar to us today, including John Ghent, Julia Meynell, Jenny Page, Angela Lomas, Roy Smith, Glenys Holloway, John O'Malley, Ken Milton, Angela Tailby, Lynn Moore, Malcolm Wardle, Rebecca Guillain, and Adrian Woodward. Her memorable career began at The Little, where she is remembered with respect and affection, and continued over 37 years taking her all over the world.

The following is from Barbara Eifler's obituary in The Stage: Antonia Collins was an exceptional stage manager over a 30-year career, nurturing, mentoring and influencing thousands of colleagues in the performing arts. Her first job after graduating from the Welsh College of Music and Drama in 1991 was as assistant stage manager on a production of Pygmalion at Theatr Clwyd; I was the stage manager.

Subsequently, she spent several years working for Travelling Opera and Ten Out of Ten Productions before having her first child in 1996. This prompted a change of career, to become an inspired and inspiring stage

management educator. In 2000 she took up a lecturing role at the Royal Welsh College of Music and Drama, where she remained until 2015 when she became head of entertainment technology, management and design at the Hong Kong Academy for Performing Arts.

In 2018, she was invited to create a new faculty post of visiting assistant professor in stage management at Florida State University. Following her master's in Digital Education in 2019, she set up the courses online to make her profession accessible to all. Most recently, she created an education and professional development programme for designers and technicians in India, with director Bruce Guthrie, head of theatre and film at the National Centre for the Performing Arts in Mumbai.

Her enthusiasm, good humour, and willingness to support colleagues and friends were boundless. Her smile would light up a room and her laugh be heard a mile away, but (classic stage manager) your secret would always be safe with her.

Antonia Collins, born Antonia Elizabeth Kennell in Leicester on February 15, 1970, died unexpectedly and peacefully on April 30, aged 53. She leaves behind son Tomos from her first marriage to former New Theatre Cardiff chief electrician Nick Derrick, her husband of 23 years, sound designer and audio consultant Andy Collins, and their son Joseff.



# Review: Bouncers (Remix)

This was certainly different from anything I've seen before. I'd seen bits of it during rehearsals, and I was not disappointed – in fact, I thoroughly enjoyed it.

I thought actors Steve Feeney, Allan Smith, Steve Finlay and Steve Elliott were believable in all the different parts they had to play and the timing was impeccable – brilliantly directed by Jane Towers.

It bought back my time of going down the Palais de Dance with my mates, and although this play was originally produced in 1983 (this was a '90s remix), you do realise things don't change that much.

Music styles change, and fashion moves on, but when you're out dancing with your mates, handbags on the floor, and a few of the lads' circling to eye up the talent... these actors got it to a tee. I also enjoyed learning about what teenage lads got up to in the toilet!

The camaraderie between the bouncers wasn't always that smooth; you realised early on that there were issues between Lucky Eric (Feeney) and Judd (Smith), and it's clear that Judd loves to wind up Eric. The latter is a bit of a philosopher, and for me, he carried the play's poignancy. He had four long speeches during the play, putting the nightlife into perspective for what it really was and how dangerous it could be. The spats between Judd and Lucky Eric are quickly defused by Les (Elliott) and Ralph (Finlay).

These actors had to become barbers, hairstylists, teenage lads, teenage girls, and a disc jockey. They never left the stage and kept in the same costume, but every change was believable, and it was easy to follow who was who as the mood changed. The pace of this play was constant and I'm sure the actors were exhausted at the end.

We visited what we thought was going to be a rehearsal of *Shakespeare in Love*. When we entered 52 Down, I have never seen so many actors in one place at

the same time! It was busy with John Bale – costume designer extraordinaire – sorting out the actors' costumes.

We did see a little bit of rehearsal with director Steve Illidge walking the Nurse (played by Susan Dale) through opening the curtains to find Shakespeare (Edward Turner) in a compromising position with Thomas Kent/Viola de Lesseps (Nicole Collins). What I found fascinating and a bit daunting was the director! Goodness, how do you orchestrate that big a

company to perform on stage? The script Steve was holding was dotted with post-it notes and looked well used. Steve is an act all by himself and he has so much energy. I talked about this to Theatre Manager Graham Muir (who played Burbage) who told me that Steve could do every part and is amazing to watch.

We then saw a rehearsal of *Bouncers (Remix)*, directed by Jane Towers. Boy, this was also looking good! It's so lovely when you see actors enjoying what they are doing. The set looked different from the norm, so I looked forward to seeing how it worked. For an amateur theatre, we do have some very talented people.

The next Connections takes place on September 5 at 7pm. All welcome.

## What was the first theatre show you saw?

My strongest memory is of my first west end show, we went to see Cats with my primary school, I must have been about seven.
