The Season in Summary

Our marketing trustee Tom Young saw, crewed, or was in every senior production of the season. This is his summary of 2022-23.

September

It was an honour to play a significant role in the opening play of the season, *Black Coffee*. Unfortunately, my identity as the murderer was spoiled for my colleagues, after my boss's Dad indirectly informed them: "You wanna get rid of that Tom; he's already killed one boss this week."

LAOS's visit for Adrian Mole showed off so much of the younger talent in our community, supported by some of our veterans. An utterly charming production with a Leicesterlink, and a strong lead performance from Zach Ball.

October

I was prompting for *The Shape of Things*; a hard-hitting play, with a brutal twist. The four-person cast delivered incredibly strong performances, underscored by a killer soundtrack.

The Idols' production of 42nd Street was best remembered for





its stunning, Broadway-inspired choreography, with the stage filled with tap dancers.

Alphabetical Order was a study of the micro-interactions that occur between colleagues during the workday, and the clash between the blandness of order and the vibrancy of chaos.

November

Black Comedy Entertaining Mr Sloane was heavy on the black – the kind of play that stays with you for a couple of days. Top marks for commitment to Carolos Dandolo, who remained dead on the floor throughout the interval.

By contrast, KPAOS' 9 to 5: The Musical was one of the lighter shows of the year, and one of my favourites. The chemistry between the cast was palpable, with no shortage of memorable musical numbers.

December

I watched *Aladdin* several times from the dome, manning a follow spot for some performances. Nice to play a small role in bringing joy to families at Christmas and illuminate the glitter!

January

Educating Rita gave David Lovell and Leeann Rana a chance to stretch their dramatic chops, with Willy Russell's legendary two-hander. A pair of great actors holding the audience captive for two hours – bravo to them.

February

The York Realist was an intimate story. John Moulding presented a sympathetic but tragic figure, whose sense of identity got in the way of his own happiness.

March

A unique set transformed the stage for *Bedroom Farce*, with three very different bedrooms on display. An incredibly strong cast provided much hilarity and authentic relationships.

April

We started what will hopefully become a tradition with our Easter musical, *The Railway Children*. I adored being Mr Perks; working with some of my favourite LDS veterans as well as some very talented young actors. The future of the LDS! Leigh



White took on a ridiculous amount of work as director, MD, and one-man orchestra. I will not let his commitment be forgotten (he was getting up at 4am to record orchestrations before work).

Switching from trains to ships, LOPs arrived for Anything Goes. The Cole Porter classic had everything I'd want from an iconic musical, while still feeling fresh and fun. Some brilliant choreography and a showstealing turn from Russell Webster made for a highly memorable production.

Unfortunately, the only production I missed this season was the youth theatre's take on James and the Giant Peach. I heard excellent things, and I'm excited to see Andy Longley-Brown's progress with our young actors continue to bear fruit.

May

Home I'm Darling was the most recently written play of our season and had an original concept that was easy to buy into from the first surprise reveal. A captivating performance from Caitlin Mottram and a fascinating exploration of gender roles and expectations.

WAOS' production of *Ghost: The Musical* moved audiences to tears with the story of Sam and Molly. A fantastic use of technology and projection to help establish this in New York, and great use of lighting to distinguish between the dead and the living.

June

I really enjoyed *Bouncers (Remix)*, featuring one of my best mates. This updated "remix" version is a little dated now, with certain attitudes looking out of place in 2023... But,



as a reflection of 1993, right on the money. The physical theatre and dynamic performances made for a very funny play.

KW Productions returned for musical epic *Gypsy* following their recent NODA award recognition for 2022's *Calendar Girls*. A career-defining performance from Debbie Longley-Brown as Momma Rose was rightly recognised at The Sooty Awards, but the rest of the cast was phenomenal too.

July

I got to tread the boards again for *Shakespeare in Love*. I was blown away by leads Ed Turner and Nicole Collins who put in great performances every night. Great to share the run with such a large and talented cast; many new friends made.

Our final show of the season was Last Word Productions' Celebratory Centenary Old Time Musical Hall. A charming show rife with audience participation and singalongs. I'm leading the campaign for Bill Hinds to be the chairman of every variety show going forward!

The inaugural Sooty Awards closed out the season, and it was my genuine honour to host the event. It's possibly the proudest I've been of any show or event I've ever produced, as it was so wonderful to see both LDS and the operatic societies members celebrating together and dancing the night away. Thank you to all who came, and hopefully, see you again next year.

Karen emphasised that she's always enjoyed the steadfast support of her partner Andy who has been a perceptive and honest critic! She introduced him to the theatre and he now loves attending plays as much as she does (she's yet to convince him about opera). However, Karen says he'd never tread the boards, although his dulcet tones have been heard in recorded voiceovers in a couple of productions. At this point, I had to remind Karen that this profile was about her.

Hobbies

She is an amazing artist and takes huge inspiration from the photos she shoots backstage, creating paintings and drawings from the results. She held an exhibition of her work when she joined The Little. Karen sees many ballet, opera and theatre as time and funds permit, including a yearly visit to the Edinburgh Fringe and International Festivals. Karen secretly would love to be able to tap dance. Well, watch this space as it's not much of a secret anymore!

Recently, Karen had a dream trip to the Royal Opera House, enjoying a backstage tour with Royal Ballet Director Kevin O'Hare and watching a rehearsal with legendary dancers Marianela Nunez and Vadim Muntagirov. She had a privileged view of the construction of sets and costumes for a new production of *Cinderella*, and it amused her that the Fairy Godmother was in Lilac, the same colour John Bale dressed her in when she played Fairy G in his production for The Little.

Productions

Karen has enjoyed being part of the Little for over a quarter of a century. I for one love to see her on Stage – she has an amazing stage presence. She has special memories of numerous outings in the plays of Alan Ayckbourn, with Mary Jones as Director and Adam Jones as her stage husband.

She enjoys singing and has a lovely voice. Her friend Keiran Whelan of KW Productions gave her a chance to become involved in musicals when he cast her in the iconic role of Joanne in Sondheim's Company. Karen has done a bit of singing in Panto, Old Time Musical Hall, and as Glinda in The Wizard of Oz but she was known primarily as a non-singing, non-dancing actress! Recently, Karen was on stage in KW's production of Gypsy playing two hugely contrasting roles, secretary Miss Cratchit and stripper Miss Mazeppa.

Karen has some indelible memories of her time helping Julia Meynell with specials and the Leicester Comedy Festival, meeting celebs as diverse as Jonathan Agnew, Barry Norman, Michael McIntyre, Patricia Routledge, Lee Mack, Josh Widdicombe, Rhod Gilbert and the legendary John Shuttleworth. Karen nearly had a breakdown with Barry Norman, a delightful man, as he only turned up at the theatre with 15 minutes to spare. Rhod Gilbert turned up in a snowstorm, announced "I'm sick", and a dash to procure Strepsils followed. The Leicester audience was fortunate as he was forced to cancel subsequent shows. And Chris McCausland made it to the theatre despite a car crash en route.



During the first scene of *She Stoops* to *Conquer*, the audience seemed restless and amused before a word had been said. Agitated fluttering of wings signalled the presence of a non-paying, avian punter; a bird had found its way into the auditorium. Karen tweaked a line, declaring: "Here we are, living in a bird-infested old inn." The audience enjoyed the acknowledgement, and the bird dutifully made its escape.

Review: Shakespeare in Love

What amazing talent we have at the Little Theatre. I so enjoyed this production. We had the lot: a dog, music, singing, dancing acting, sword fighting and costume contemporary/period.

It was lovely to see new faces in this production. Ed Turner who played Shakespeare had great stage presence and you could feel the chemistry between him and Viola de Lessops (Nicole Collins). Hopefully, we'll see more of Ed. In November he'll be playing Mr Poppy in KPAOS's Nativity! I know I've singled out Ed but the whole cast was brilliant. The comedic timing was spot on, and it kept a good pace, which to me is very important. With how many cast members were in this production, it could have easily sagged, which goes to show the talent and the brilliant directing by Steve Illidge.

I enjoyed the angst between many of the characters, especially between Fennyman (Pete Bing) and Henslowe (lan Carr). Fennyman was the equivalent of today's lone sharks and Henslowe – a bit of a con man really – put me in mind of Fagin from *Oliver Twist*. The sword fighting was great with some nifty footwork from Graham Muir who played Burbage. Rory the dog played Spot and won all the hearts of the audience.

Costumes designed by John Bale were very clever and gave an essence of Elizabethan dress whilst allowing movement, which this incredible play needed. The music in



this production brought everything together and also took you back to that period in history.

I asked my niece Michelle her opinion and I'll let her words sum it up: "It was brilliant. The set worked brilliantly and looked great. It was well designed and actors were able to make use of all of it and it enhanced their performances. There was some great comedy in the play and of course; the dog! The acting was amazing and very well-rehearsed. I'd never seen the film but found it very easy to follow."

The team undertakes training in and provides mentoring/shadowing for Stage Manager (SM), Deputy Stage Manager (DSM) and Assistant Stage Manager (ASM) roles, as well as lighting and sound design/operation. It supports designers and workshop staff on production sets, furniture needs and properties (props), as well as script prompting. The team liaises with productions committee on LDS show requirements and the facilities team on maintenance, equipment, health & safety, and insurance facilities, as required.

What was the first theatre show you saw?

I'm not sure what the first production I saw was, however I have a recollection of seeing my Uncle Matthew as The Big Bad Wolf in a production of Little Red Riding Hood when I was about five years old. This was somewhere in Melbourne.

What was the first play/musical you were in?

Does the Christmas Pageant during a Church service when I was around six years old count? I was one of the Three Kings, which I thought I got because of my last name. Other than that, it would be as an Elf in a school production of The Night Before Christmas when I was around 9 or 10. My family were performing one way or another all around me, so it just felt natural to be involved.

What's your favourite role you've played to date (and why)?

Poirot – this was a challenge as it was as far away from playing myself physically, vocally and mentally as I've had to play before, and he's such an iconic character.

King Finvarra in a musical called Are There Any at the Bottom of Your Garden which is about five kids who venture into Fairyland. I've been in around five or six runs of this play and I guess it means so much to me as it was my first ever professional role when I was 16 years old.

What's your dream role that you're yet to play (and why)?

I've never been sure how to answer this question. Something that has a strong character arc along with a good mixture of comedy and tragedy in it.

What's the best theatre show you've ever seen?

Any performance has something to give and enjoy, and with this in mind I don't have a favourite piece of theatre that I've seen. One that stands out I guess is seeing Marcel Marceau at the Melbourne Arts centre back in the early 80s. It was incredible.

What's your favourite thing about The Little Theatre?

It is such a warm, welcoming, and creative environment and community. There are so many opportunities for everyone to become involved in one way or another. It's a pleasure to be involved!

Tell us about your upcoming production!

The upcoming production that I'm in is A Murder is Announced by Agatha Christie. It's another classic Christie mystery, complete with a couple of murders of course, interesting characters and the ever-popular Miss Marple. I play Inspector Craddock, a sharp and slightly sarcastic character who at first does not take to Miss Marple's interfering ways. It's a strong cast with many familiar faces and some new, a great story, and on top of all that, directed by John Bale. I'm looking forward to it very much!
